





JACK STRICKLIN CALF ROPING

AT THE PRESCOTT RODEO IN 1988

At 78 years old, Jack Sticklin is living proof that it's never too late to chase what you love — especially if it involves a rope, and a good horse!

Jack has always had a passion for calf roping. It's part of who he is. But at 46, life got busy, and roping took a backseat. For more than 30 years, he stayed off the arena dirt — until a wake-up call changed everything.

In July 2024, Jack underwent triple bypass surgery. The experience gave him a new perspective. Jack said...

## I realized I didn't want to have any regrets, I missed roping more than I even realized. 99


Determined to get back to what he loved, Jack started swinging a rope again. But after a calf ran into his right shoulder during practice, he was left with pain that made even lifting his arm a challenge.

By the time Jack came to West Texas Rehab Center in November 2024, he couldn't swing a rope above his head — something he once did with ease.

His evaluation showed he was dealing with three torn tendons in his rotator cuff, revealed by recent MRIs and X-rays from his doctor in Amarillo. He'd also received a stem cell injection to help with pain and inflammation, which had started to bring some relief.

Although the pain had mostly subsided at rest, Jack still felt it when reaching overhead or behind—two essential movements for roping. But his goal was clear: regain enough strength to rope again.

With guidance and consistent therapy, Jack committed to doing whatever it took. Over the next several weeks, he showed up to each appointment ready to work. By January 2025, his therapist, Luke Lopez, had good news!



"Jack has been coming to therapy consistently and has made great progress. His range of motion and strength have improved, and he's back to riding and practicing roping."

Now, Jack is back in the saddle — literally — swinging his rope with renewed purpose! "I just wanted to rope again. And thanks to West Texas Rehab, I can!"

Jack's story is a reminder that it's never too late to get back to what makes you feel alive — and that with hard work, the right care, and a little grit, anything's possible.

Jack's treatment plan was not determined by what his insurance would pay...it was determined by how much therapy he needed to reach his full potential and the goals he set. ## NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS

In the heart of West Texas, generosity isn't just an ideal—it's a way of life. For more than 70 years, West Texas Rehabilitation Center has stood as a lifeline for patients across the region, offering world-class therapy and care regardless of a person's ability to pay. And for more than six decades, the agricultural community has helped make that possible through Round Up for Rehab, one of the most enduring and beloved fundraisers in WTRC's history.



The origin of Round-Up for Rehab is as humble and heartfelt as the people who built it. In 1960, Edna Wylie visited the Rehab Center in Abilene and was struck by what she saw. At the time, Shelley Smith—the center's lone physical therapist—was doing all he could to serve patients in need. But Edna saw the truth: the facility wouldn't survive without financial help.

Back at the Chadbourne Ranch, Edna shared her concern with her husband, Conda Wylie. It was a tough time—West Texas was still recovering from the drought of the 1950s, cattle numbers were low, and the market was just as dry. Cash was scarce. But the Wylies didn't hesitate. Conda donated a few head of cattle and told Shelley Smith to sell them and use the proceeds to help keep the Rehab doors open.

That simple act of generosity sparked something bigger than anyone could have imagined. Originally called the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, the fundraiser quickly gained momentum. Ranchers and ag producers across the region followed the Wylies' lead, donating livestock and supporting the mission in the best way they knew how. Shelley Smith fanned the flame, and the ranching community made sure it never burned out.



Today, Round-Up for Rehab is a powerful, community-driven tradition that fuels patient care across all three WTRC campuses—in Abilene, San Angelo, and Ozona. Each year, livestock shows, auctions, ag events, and rural businesses come together to raise critical funds for therapy services that change lives: speech therapy for a child, physical rehab for a stroke survivor, hospice care for a loved one in their final days.

The West Texas Rehab Foundation ensures that every dollar raised through Round-Up for Rehab is put to work providing care, expanding access, and keeping the doors open for those in need. And with rural healthcare access becoming increasingly limited, that work is more important than ever.

Round-Up for Rehab isn't just a fundraiser—
it's a living legacy. From Edna and Conda
Wylie's first gift of cattle to today's ag
community, it's proof that small herds and
big hearts can do extraordinary things. It's about
neighbors helping neighbors. Ranchers lifting

He's judged livestock shows across the country, served on stock show boards, and earned recognition as a 20 Under 40 honoree in 2015. But perhaps most importantly, Wade brings a passion for rural communities that's both personal and powerful.



Bob's journey began in the small towns of Christoval, where he spent his early career coaching young became a petroleum landman, but his life took a deeply rooted wife Sandra settled in Schleicher County.

There, under the guidance of Sandra's family, Bob learned about the life of ranching, raising cattle to the San Angelo and goats on the land they loved.

It was ranching that first connected Bob to West Texas Rehab.

That small act of participation sparked a lifelong commitment. Bob was soon invited to serve on the Tom Green County Round-Up for Rehab committee, and he eventually joined the West Texas Rehab Board of Directors, serving as Chairman for several years. Today, he continues to provide leadership and guidance on the Executive Board and as a Foundation Trustee.

"I have seen firsthand the good that West Texas Rehab does for so many," Bob says. "It truly is a first-class organization."

Bob's dedication doesn't stop at board meetings or livestock donations. He's become a powerful advocate for the organization, encouraging others -individuals, businesses, and civic groups—to get involved.

"All you have to do is walk through the doors of the treatment facilities at West Texas Rehab and you'll get it," Bob says. "They do so much for so many folks. And I encourage anyone I meet to do just that."

In 2004, Bob's connection to the Rehab took on a deeper, more personal meaning. His beloved wife Sandra suffered a sudden aneurysm. After critical weeks in a San Antonio hospital and inpatient rehab, Bob knew exactly where to bring her for the next stage of healing-West Texas Rehab.

"They welcomed Sandra with open arms and knew what we needed before I did."

Bob says. "It came full circle for me—the impact that the Rehab makes."

That experience solidified what Bob already knew: West Texas Rehab isn't just a place it's a lifeline.

For over 20 years, Bob has hosted a local Round-Up Supper at his ranch in Schleicher County, bringing together neighbors and friends in support of the mission. It's a tradition rooted in generosity and encompasses the true meaning of 'neighbor helping neighbor.'

When asked why he continues to give his time and heart to West Texas Rehab, Bob's answer is simple: "It gives me purpose, and I enjoy being a small part of something much bigger."

And through his unwavering commitment, Bob Helmers has become something much bigger himself—a beacon of service, compassion, and inspiration. West Texas Rehab is better because of Bob Helmers, and so are the people of West Texas!


